Slugger Factory & Museum

Explore The Waterfront, Historic Louisville, Churchill Downs, the Big Four Bridge & More!



- A. River Front Plaza/Belvedere Over 7 acres of lawns, fountains, stages, and historic statues continue as a popular Louisville venue for outdoor concerts.
- B. Kentucky Center for the Performing Arts Louisville's premiere arts venue. The Louisville Orchestra, Kentucky Opera, Louisville Ballet, and many more play and perform at the center of Louisville's performing arts scene.
- C. Slugger Museum and Factory The 120 foot tall baseball bat at the entrance weighs 34 tons and is made of carbon steel. Pose with sculptures of baseball's greats, and don't miss the guided factory tour!
- D. West Main Historic District One of downtown Louisville's five districts, the West Main Historic District is known for historic buildings and for the collection of well known museums - known colloquially as "Museum Row."
- E. Museum Row Four city blocks in the West Main Historic District, including an astounding ten museums! No matter what your interests, there's something to see!
- F. Fourth Street Live! Louisville's premiere dining & entertainment destination. Venues include Hard Rock Cafe, Gordon Biersch Brewing Company, mechanical bull riding at PBR, and the world's first Maker's Mark Bourbon House & Lounge.
- G. The Louisville Palace The iconic Palace Theatre opened in 1928, and boasts a distinct look with an ornate Spanish Baroque interior.
- H. The Brennan House Voted one of the top ten favorite buildings in Louisville, Brennan House was built in 1868 and is available for group tour reservations.
- I. Louisville Theatre District From burlesque to vaudeville, Louisville was once home to a thriving theater district. The iconic Palace Theatre opened in 1928, and boasts an ornate Spanish Baroque interior. Be sure to visit nearby historic Brown Theatre, with state-of-the-art technology and a beautiful performance space.
- J. Louisville Free Public Library/Main Public Library Opened in 1908, this is the largest public library system in Kentucky. There are 16 additional branches.

- K. Memorial Auditorium A memorial honoring Louisville residents who served in WWI, the Auditorium's classic Greek Revival architecture and superb acoustics make this theater perfect for high profile performances like The Rolling Stones and Bruce Springsteen.
- L. Central Park Dubbed "DuPont Square," this park opened for public use in the 1870s. During the Southern Exposition in 1883, the park showcased Thomas Edison's new invention - the incandescent light bulb, making Central Park the world's first display of the light bulb.
- M. Churchill Downs/The Kentucky Derby Home to "The fastest two minutes in sports," the Kentucky Derby is held at the historic Churchill Downs since 1875. Visit the Derby Museum to meet a thoroughbred horse and relive famous Derby photo finishes through the years!
- N. University of Louisville (Closed for renovations.) Famous for the first artificial heart transplant and the first blood bank, this university offers degrees in over 60 fields! Be sure to visit Speed Art Museum, Louisville's largest Art Museum.
- O. East Market Galleries This district is known for galleries showcasing local, regional and national artists, unique stores, antique shops and a number of upscale restaurants.
- P. Thomas Edison House A young Thomas Edison lived here while he worked as a telegraph operator. It's now a museum displaying the inventor's discoveries, photos, and more.
- Q. Louisville Slugger Field Home to the Minor League Baseball team, the Louisville Bats, Slugger Field is named after the popular Louisville Slugger bat made just down the road.
- R. Louisville Waterfront Park/Big Four Bridge One of Louisville's largest parks. The park includes the Great Lawn, urban art and sculpture, and the well-known Lincoln Memorial. At 5,252 feet long, the Big Four Bridge was completed in 2013 and serves as a pedestrian bridge, linking Kentucky and Indiana.
- S. Colgate Clock in Clarksville, Indiana Previous home of the Colgate company, this large clock is one of the largest in the world. Look up to the romantic River Restaurant revolving atop the Galt House or spy the mosaic design on the Ali Center.
- T. Falls of the Ohio Located across the Ohio River in Clarksville, IN., these impressive 386-million-year-old fossil beds are naturally exposed Devonian fossil beds. The park features a spectacular interpretive center overlooking the fossil beds.
